
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




integrate with the building. We are now offering to host events ("The Johnson Special") or attend events to open shop



The Art of Scratchboard

Scratchboard is a monochromatic drawing medium, characterized by a board coated with a layer of fine white or silver clay, subsequently covered with a layer of India ink. Initially, the drawing surface is entirely black. Artists create their drawings by using an etching tool to scratch lines through the ink. The more lines they scratch, the more detailed and brighter the artwork becomes. To produce scratchboard art, artists must employ an etching tool to remove the black ink from the board. In **Taylor Lodespoto's** Studio Art class, students delved into this artistic element of Line. Through this project, they honed their skills in various line-making techniques, enabling them to achieve a range of shading effects. As a result, students were able to craft lifelike depictions of animals on scratchboard!


