Through the Senior Experience program, 75 students worked together with the support of faculty models to raise \$12,000 for The JED

Alternative Program (M.A.P.), the Twilight Program, the Electrical and HVAC/R Training Center, the BMUST Union offices, the Community Mainstreaming Associates, the AHRC program, the Parent Center, the Senior Community Service Center, and the TLC Daycare Center. One of the gifts that the PREP Academy has brought to the building is its ability to connect with everyone. This is why last week it hosted its *2nd Annual* 

Brookside Day of Bonding! According to Rebecca Menachem who teaches at both PREP and MAP, "This is an initiative to unite the students, staff, and agencies within the Brookside building as well as help the students emerge into leadership roles by running booths for the preschool children.
